Programs & Achievements:

Agriculture Sustainability Project (Under Livelihood Program):

Agriculture is an important sector of Indian economy as it contributes about 17% to the total GDP and provides employment to over 60% of the population. Indian agriculture has registered impressive growth over past few decades. But due to climate change, floods, drought and other challenges as marketability fair trade, a decreasing trend is also been observed to the farmer's especially to the small holders, fragmented land holdings, quality of seeds, use of manure, fertilizers and bio-pesticides, irrigation facilities etc. To overcome this shortcoming, intensive capacity

building of these farmers has been undertaken in Climate smart technology, skill development training related to agriculture.

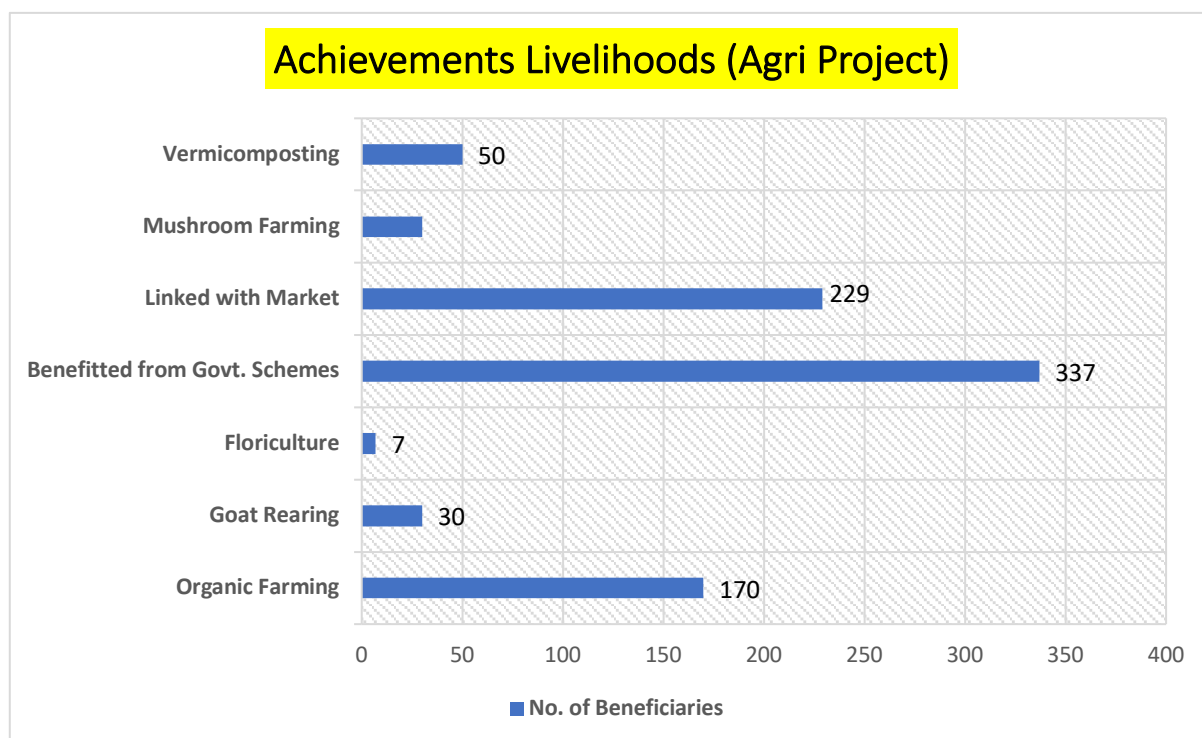

Impact & Outcome:

- 170 farmers from Janauli and Khajurka (Palwal District, Haryana) are doing Organic farming after the training and support
- 7 farmers are doing floriculture (Rajanigandha, Rose & Marigold) farming

- 337 farmers were Linkage with Government Scheme
- Increase in income by connecting more than 229 farmers to the market. And this trend continues, these farmers are continuously selling their agricultural produce to the vendors
- Distributed 50 Vermibeds to the farmers. 50 farmers started making compost and each farmer is preparing 40 to 50 quintals of manure.
- 30 farmers were given training in goat farming and they are doing the same in commercial prospect
- 30 farmers were given training on three types of Mushroom for livelihoods
- Before training farmers were doing only cash crops, after training maximum farmers are cultivating commercial vegetables and earning more than their previous practice.





Healthcare Project (Medical Mobile Unit):

Mobile Health Units are part of a strategy for the provision of occasional ambulatory health services. The choice of services offered varies, but typically includes a range of preventive measures (immunization, health promotion, disease screening), as well as curative services (usually surgical or dental care). Services are by nature intermittent, which means that Mobile Health Units suffer from intrinsic constraints which must be considered before a decision is made about which services to provide.

The key objective of the MHU was to reach to populations in remote and inaccessible areas in which a set of preventive and curative services were included but it was not limited to Rural Community Health services, which was free to the patient at the point of care (as suggested by National Health Mission).

The overall project goal was to "improve the health conditions of the community". An attempt has been made to achieve this by organizing and sensitizing the village communities to adopt better health practices and lead better lives. Under this project, we attempted to develop a holistic approach to enhance new and existing systems of health management so as to lead to sustainable economic and social development of the community.

Activities:

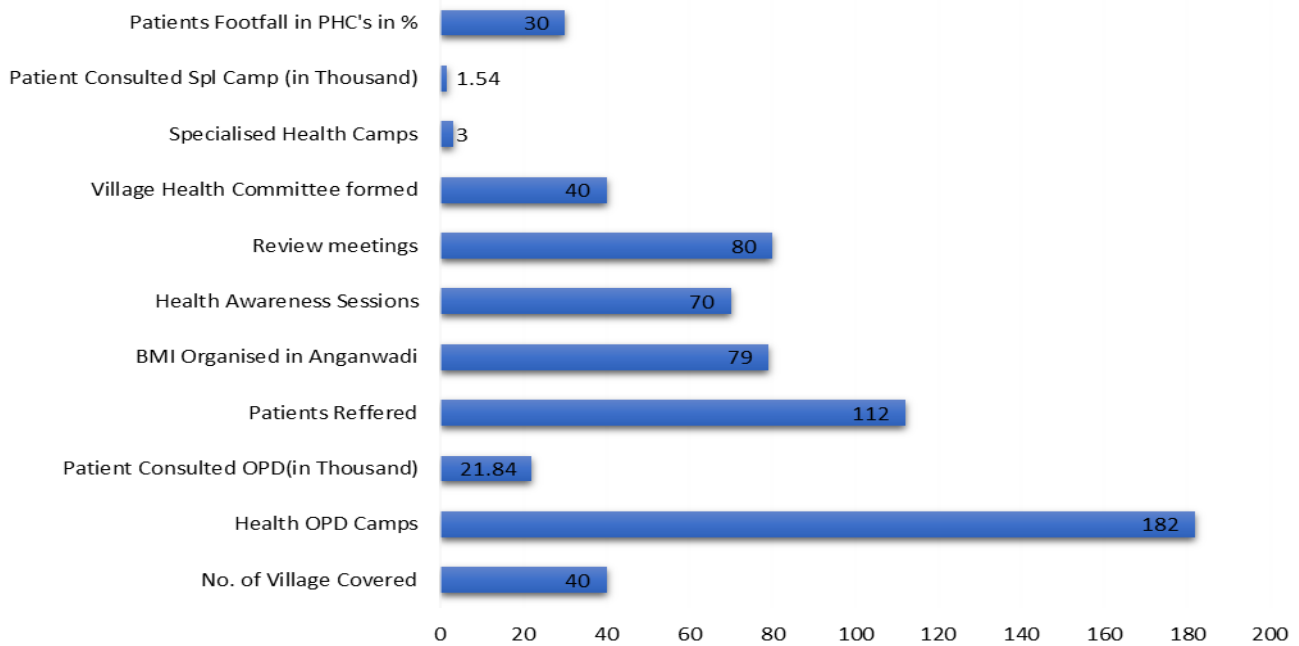
- Baseline / Need Assessment survey of 40 villages.
- Formation of Village Health Committee.
- Mobilization, Engagement & Awareness in 40 villages.
- Operating the MHU in all the targeted 40 villages.
- Providing health diagnosis and distribution of medicine.
- Organizing Specialised Health Camps basis on the patient disease trends.
- Conduct awareness sessions (IEC/BCC) among targeted population in 40 villages amongst the expecting and lactating mothers, adolescents girls and adult male regarding balance diet, substance abuse, personal hygiene, open defecation, importance of washing hands, etc.
- Training and capacity building of Anganwadi/ASHA workers
- Engaging Anganwadi, ASHA workers & PHC officials for health seeking behavior of the population.
- Conducting weekly Physical & Mental Health awareness for the underprivileged children on every Saturday
- Engaging with Government Health Department officials for linking healthcare schemes.
- Devising a comprehensive referral mechanism & documentation for chronic and severe illness patients.
- Encourage people to visit the existing Government healthcare institutions like PHC, CHC and District Hospitals.

Impact & Outcome:

- The Mobile OPD facility with free medicine was made available in 40 villages
- A total of 21837 patients were consulted, and medicines were distributed in 182 camps
- 112 cases were referred to the government hospital, out of which 98 have been recovered and 13 are under treatment
- A total of 79 BMI was conducted, in which 125 children were found to be malnourished
- The parents of these malnourished children have been consulted, and nutritious cereals have been provided
- A total of 72 health awareness sessions were conducted, sensitizing more than 1500 women and adolescent girls
- A total of 70 Community awareness & engagement session have been conducted.
- A total of 80 review meetings were held with Asha & Anganwadi workers and the parents of malnourished children
- Formed 40 village health committees, oriented them and linked them to the government health system
- With 3 specialised Doctors, we have organised 4 special health camp, In which 1544 people from 22 villages got benefit
- The footfall of patients in PHCs has increased by 30% and for this we have been appreciated by various PHCs
- A training session has been organised for Anganwadi/ ASHA workers on capacity building

Education & Skill Training:

Ensuring education is an open resource. Along with skills development, it is a key enabler for inclusive growth & sustainable development and stimulates economic growth and improves standard of living.

Education reforms are progressively driven by a growing understanding of how to go about successfully improving education including teaching and learning in schools. Strategic Planning and interventions is therefore essential to support policy reforms, effective planning and implementation of programmes, coordination with stakeholders, knowledge management, research and innovation, training and capacity building, as well as reaching out directly to disadvantaged sections of society. We contribute to education and skills development through new, diversified approaches, including private sector partnerships, civil society strengthening, non-governmental organisation support and designing policy interventions including redesigning the curriculum to spark entrepreneurship.

Activities:

- Mobilized and mentored 590 candidates for online skill training
- Organizing online skill training.
- 498 candidates were trained.
- Job placement support also provided; 427 candidates were placed on suitable jobs.
- 5 awareness sessions on Environment (Waste Management) have been organized in schools.
- Mobilized, trained and linked to potential market 60

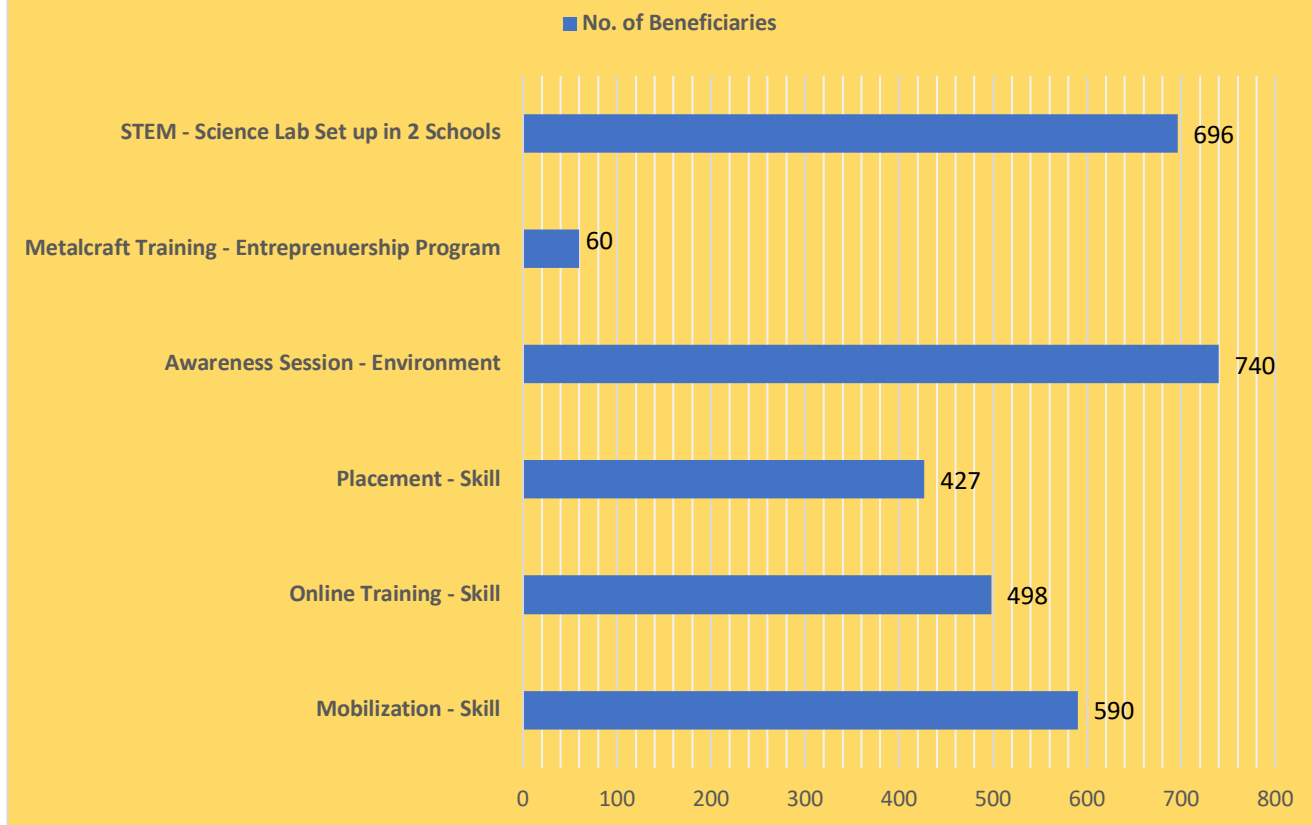
unemployed and illiterate candidates for metal craft training.

- Stem Lab installed and supported in 2 schools

Impact & Outcome:

- Increase in Confidence Level of youth.
- Youth raised the socioeconomic status of the family.
- Improvement in standard of living.
- Improved financial sustainability among women.
- Improving productivity and living.
- School children got the right information about waste management.
- Students are contributing to keeping the school and the locality clean.
- Entrepreneur and self-reliant were made by training 60 candidates.
- The use of STEM labs is encouraging students, the spirit of teamwork and collaboration, and facilitating the use of technology. Simultaneously promoting the application of knowledge and skills.

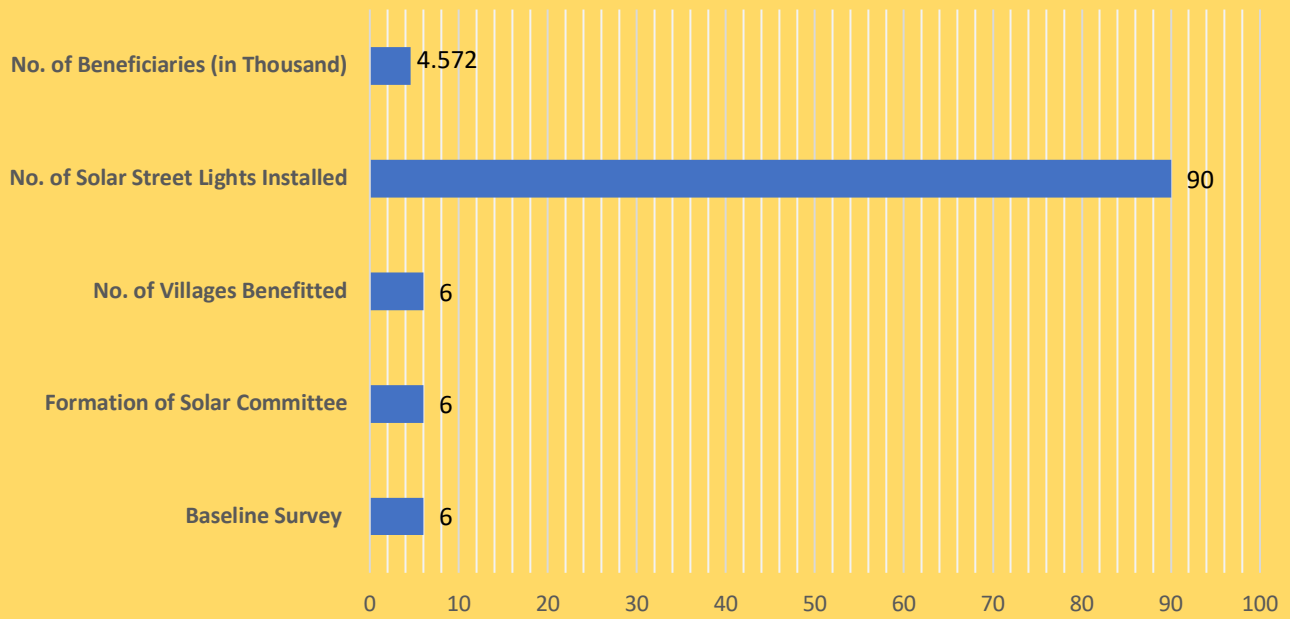
